What is your current job title and who is your employer?

Senior Records Manager, Cargill

How long have you been in the rim industry and how did you get your start?

My Bachelor of Science degree from St. Cloud State University was a business degree focused on Business Education and Office Administration (BEOA), which included Records Management. Although I hadn't set out to work in the field of Records Management, when it came time to do an internship, the more interesting projects to choose from were in the field of Records Management. I did an extended internship, which included a number of RIM-related projects, from the Summer of 1989 through the Fall and Winter of 1990. During that time, I met and worked with some colleagues in RIM who I am still connected with today. After graduation in 1990, I continued to work in the field of Records and Information Management for different companies and as an Independent Records Management Consultant. As of June, 2019, I will have worked in the field of RIM for 30 years.

What do you enjoy most about your current position?

At Cargill, I work in the Records and Information Management Center of Expertise (RIM COE). The part of my responsibility that I enjoy the most is managing Cargill's Records Retention Schedules, particularly understanding the global recordkeeping requirements and reflecting those in the policy and procedure framework.
